Voted That Mr. Paige act as agent to purchase coal, etc.
for the library.

Voted To approve list of books submitted by librarian.

Voted-That Rand & McNally atlas be laid on the table.

Voted- That "the story of Jesus" be left to the discre-
tion of the Librarian-to buy either book or pictures,
or both.

Voted-To ratify the plans of the librarian as stated to
the trustees as to vacations of herself and Miss

Plimpton.

Records of last meeting approved.

Trustees acknowledged receipt of notice from selectmen appointing George Grant and L.O. Rieutord as members of the Library board for two years.

Notice also received of the appointment of E.B. Armstrong by Robert Edwards, as representative of the Edwards family on the Library board, filling the vacancy caused by the death of J.M. Cochran.

Voted- To buy from the Mynott fund "The maritime history of Massachusetts".

November 10

Voted- To purchase from the Mynott fund Sargent's "Handbook of New England".

Voted- To close the library on Armistice day.

December 8

January 12

The regular meeting of the Trustees was held on January 12th. Present Messrs. Chapin, Corbin, Tetreault, Grant.

Voted- To purchase the list of books as recommended by the Librarian.

Voted- That the report of the Librarian as presented be adopted and ordered printed.

Voted- That an appropriation of \$6500 be asked for the current year for the library.

Voted- That the matter of opening the library on Sundays during the winter months be laid on the table, there not being present a full board of trustees.

Voted- That the meetings of the Trustees be held on the first Thursday of the month, instead of the second Thursday as in the past, and that the Librarian endeavor to have the bills ready, as far as possible,
