REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

1956 is the year of the new Children's Room. A gift of the Trust Fund to the town, work was started Agust 13 after many months of planning. Two solid brick walls were removed in the basement making one large room from three gloomy ones. Dark woodwork was bleached, a new floor laid, new ceilings, lights and a separate heating system installed, and the handsome creamy brick walls scrubbed. Plans had been made for a grand opening during Book Week in November, but unfortunately furnishings were delayed which postponed the opening to 1957. The room had been urgently needed for several years, and the Board of Trustees is to be commended for their foresight in providing it.

Other additions made during the year include an outside book deposit which permits the return of books when the library is closed. Also a twenty gallon tank stocked with tropical fish was provided by Mrs. Laurent Jarry and Mrs. Robert Clemence. Other patrons have contributed fish to it as well. A large inflatable plastic globe of the world was added to the Children's Side.

We were pleased to be selected as one of the 1600 libraries from 33,000 applications to be awarded a set of THE GREAT BOOKS OF THE WESTERN WORLD in January. This 5h volume set, priced at \$249.00, was given to us along with the printed catalog cards by the Old Dominion Foundation. The material within these volumes has greatly enriched the resources of this library.

The library also became a member of the Massachusetts Film Cooperative which will make even more films available to us. Adult evening movies were discontinued at the end of the year as attendance was not sufficient. In its place afternoon movies will be held for children. The subjects will concern folk stories,

nature, geography etc.

The Children's Art Class is a new addition to our activities. Mrs. Edward Quinn, a former elementary teacher, is in charge and contributes her time. Planned for children from four to ten, it is designed to correlate art materials with books and music to achieve a free expression of ideas. This meets weekly on Saturday mornings.

We also had a show of paintings by the Southbridge Community Art Guild. This was arranged in the downstairs corridor along with books on art which circulated freely. We hope this will become an annual affair.

The Summer Reading Club enrolled 135 members of which about fifty were in regular attendance at the weekly meetings. Mrs.

Mary Hazelton, Children's Librarian, was in charge assisted by Catherine Beebe and Sylvia Gregoire. Using a western theme, the Children heard stories and records, played games in the yard and were encouraged to read and report on at least sixteen books. At the final meeting, seven prize books were supplied by Doubleday Company, publishers, and were selected from catalogs by the winners.

Book Week in November was something of an anti-climax as we had expected to open our new Children's Room, but other arrangements were harriedly substituted. Afternoon movies were shown, Story hours were held at elementary schools and a special program of stories was given at the library. This was conducted by Mr. Harry Schuman of the Thames Book Company who awarded fifteen prize books during a quiz contest. Posters were distributed to all the schools.

A Fine Free Day was held in April. One-third of the seriously delinquent books were returned including ones due since 1948 and 1950.

The Senior Girl Scouts provided a great deal of excellent volunteer help during the year. Several Girl Scout and Brownie Troops visited the library for instruction or to work on badges.

The librarian and members of the staff attended several library meetings within the state. The librarian also gave book talks to The University of Life, Girl Scout Council, West Street PTA, and several church groups. Station WESO invited the Children's Librarian to speak on the summer reading program and the librarian to talk during United Nations Week on Esther Costa's "Over the Back Fence." Library instruction was given to seven high school English classes followed by assignments involving the use of library tools. Each of the high school teachers also received a letter cutlining materials in the library relevant to her classes and for personal use.

Plans for 1957 include opening the new Children's Room and expanding the work with both elementary and high school students; creating a special area for art and music materials as interest in this has been decidedly indicated; and contacting the business and professional people in Southbridge to inform them of the variety of sources in the library that would be helpful to them.

Special thanks are offered to those who have aided us in our public relations. The SOUTHBRIDGE EVENING NEWS, Station WESO and the Audio Visual Department of the Southbridge Public Schools have been generous to the library.

The wholehearted support of the progressive Board of Trustees and the staff as well as the fine response from the people of Southbridge are deeply appreciated by the librarian.

2. Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer's report was read and accepted by the Trustees.

3. Secretary's Report

Due to the absence of the Secretary no report was available.

4. Water Pipes

O. J. Laliberte reported that the underground cold water lines (brass piping) had become porous causing flooding in the boiler room and that the Southbridge and Webster Plumbing Company, Inc., had quoted \$530. to change these lines to copper tubing. It was suggested that a new quotation be submitted based on using the Library janitor as a helper on the job.

O. J. Laliberte also reported that the leak which occured in the new Children's Room during the January cold weather was caused by a freezeup of the pipes located in the walls and used for the old heating system.

5. Volunteer Time

Mrs. Tien reported that the Library is now receiving 29 hours a week of volunteer service, 13 of these being contributed by the Boy Scouts.

6. Desk

Mrs. Tien reported the acquisition of a used typewriter desk for the office purchased for \$10.

7. Children's Room

The Librarian reported 40 to 50 children were in attendance at the opening of the new Children's Room.

February, 1957

At 3:30 on Monday, February 11, seventy Southbridge children from both the public and parochial schools were in the Library to help move the collection of juvenile books from the main reading room of the Library to their new department downstairs. Volunteer Girl Scouts were on hand to see that the parade progressed smoothly. Roger Steele, an eighth grade pupil at Mary Wells, contributed many strenuous hours.

The Southbridge Evening News photographed the beginning of the book parade which led out the front door and around into the new entrance led by the venerable eagle. The following day circulation started from the Children's Room.

On Wednesday at 9:05 a.m. Mrs. Esther Costa of WESO broadcast her program, "Over The Back Fence" from the Children's Room. The dedication was opened by a talk by Dr. Nerio Pioppi, Chairman of the Board of Trustees. Robert Fox, Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Armand DeGrenier, Chairman of the Selectmen, Horace Landry, Executive Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce also spoke informally of the Children's Room. Present for spontaneous comments was the fourth grade of Marcy Street School and Mrs. Dion, their teacher. The broadcast was followed by a Coffee Hour for the adults and candy for the children.

Mrs. Costa had contributed an elaborate cake baked and decorated to represent the "Train to Storyland". This was kept in the display case for one week then cut and distributed to the children. She also remained during the afternoon of the broadcast to talk with parents.

Two Open Houses were held. On Monday, February 18, from 7:30 to 8:30 the Board of Trustees and their wives, Town Officials, the Senator and Representative to the State Legislature and area Librarians were invited. Mrs. Robert Clemence and Mrs. Laurent Jarry, representing the Southbridge Music Group that had donated a record collection to the Library, poured. They were assisted by several Girl Scouts.

On Tuesday, the 19th, another special Coffee Hour was held for the Southbridge teachers of both public and parochial schools. Mrs. Alice Howard, the State Consultant in Library Work with Children was the special guest. Mrs. Alex Constantine and Mrs. Norman Powers, representing the volunteer staff, poured. They were assisted by Girl Scouts. For both affairs nearly all the refreshments had been donated by patrons of the Library.

Small booklets of reading lists for children were distributed to parents. During the opening week children registered for book prizes to be awarded to each grade, pre-school through seventh. 257 Children registered with the most number from the fourth grades. The prizes were given by Doubleday and Company.

Several plants were contributed by Mrs. James Cross, Mrs. Gwynn Williams and the Wednesday Club of the Congregational Church. Mrs. Zygmund Damian gave an electric clock for the room.

The response by the children has been overwhelmingly enthusiastic and entirely justified the many months of planning.

During luncheon Mrs. Tien discussed the activities in the Library. It was reported that the special book deposit that had been prepared for grades one to three was finally put in operation the beginning of May. These books were sent to outlying schools and circulated from the classrooms. During the month they were in use, a circulation of 1,400 was realized from about 260 books.

Mrs. George Wells had given the Children's Room a handsome stereoscope with a large set of slides. It is planned to lend this for classroom use. At present the children are enjoying it.

The Round-the-World Reading Club plans were outlined and plans for a Violin Concert by children at the last meeting were mentioned. Several foreign-born adults have agreed to talk at these meetings of their childhood in their native lands.

The National Film Board of Canada offered to add this Library to their film circuit entirely without charge. Each two months, fall through spring, this Library will be provided with three color travel films of Canada to be circulated to adult groups for screenings. The subject matter will have instant appeal to the community, and will be an addition to our public services. The only cost to the Library will be postage for sending film on to the next library.

The problem was brought up of persons wanting certain books in the collection that circulate, and have for years, only to the certain person who is interested. These persons have offered to buy them which, of course, cannot be done. It was suggested that an informal loan with no due date be effected.

After the meeting was called to order, two items of business were brought up.

Repairing Gutters

Mr. Laliberte strongly recommended that the gutters on the front of the building be repaired before serious damage was done to the masonry. He agreed to talk to two roofers about this.

Replacing Shrubs

4. Use of Library by Non-Residents
