6. Art Class


Mrs. Patry has taken over the Art Class and the Librarian reported that it is difficult to limit the attendance to 20, because of its popularity.

A hearing on this bill is scheduled before the Committee on State Administration on Wednesday, January 28, 1959 at 10:30 A.M., Room 423, State House, Boston.

It is of utmost importance that there be present a large contingent of trustees, librarians, and interested citizens to speak in favor of the bill. Also, the Committee on State Administration should be in receipt of numerous telegrams and letters before the time of the hearing.

Your MLDC Committee urges you and your Library Board to take the following steps to ensure favorable action by the Committee on State Administration:

- Get in touch with the Representative and Senator from your area in the Massachusetts General Court. Urge their favorable support of the bill and an expression of this to the Committee on State Administration on or before the date of the hearing.
- Send a telegram or letter to the Committee on State Administration at the State House, addressed to a member you know, personally; or to the Chairman of the Joint Committee: Senator Richard R. Caples.
- If possible, have your library represented at the hearing; preferably, a member of the Board of Trustees.
- 4. Send the Chairman of the MLDC a brief report of the action taken by you or by the persons whom you have contacted. His address is: City Library Association, Springfield 3, Massachusetts.





3. Replacement of Trees


